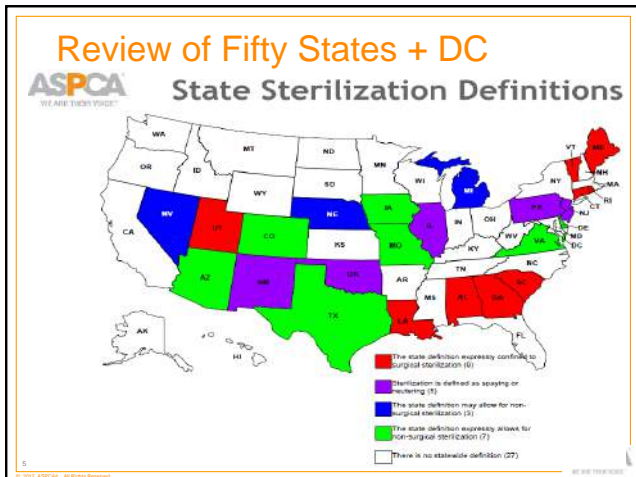

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How do states and localities define "sterilization?"

- 1) State definition expressly confined to surgical methods (9)
- 2) State definition expressly allows for non-surgical methods (7)
- 3) Sterilization defined as spaying or neutering (5)
- 4) State definition may allow for non-surgical methods (3)
- 5) No statewide definition (27)

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State definition expressly confined to surgical methods:

Code of Alabama § 3-9-1 (4)
 "Sterilization. The surgical removal of the reproductive organs of a dog or cat in order to render the animal unable to reproduce."

State definition expressly allows for non-surgical methods

"Sterilization" means the surgical removal of the reproductive organs of a dog or cat or the use of humane nonsurgical methods and technologies approved by the Food and Drug Administration, the United States Department of Agriculture or the Environmental Protection Agency to permanently render the animal unable to reproduce.
 (Ariz. Rev. Stat. § 11-1022).

DEFINITION EXPLICITLY ALLOWS FOR ALTERNATIVES TO SURGERY

State definition may allow for non-surgical methods

- doesn't expressly allow or preclude

'Alteration' means a professional sterilization procedure performed by a veterinarian that renders a dog, cat, or ferret incapable of reproducing." Michigan Compiled Laws Annotated § 287.331.

DEFINITION MAY ALLOW FOR NON-SURGICAL STERILIZATION

Sterilization defined as spay/neuter

Example 1:

"Sterilization" means rendering an animal unable to reproduce, either by the spaying of a female animal or by the neutering of a male animal. (N.M. Stat. Ann. § 77-1-19).

Sterilization defined as spay/ neuter

Example 2:

"Neuter" means to render a male dog or cat unable to reproduce;

"Spay" means to remove the ovaries of a female dog or cat in order to render said animal unable to reproduce; and

"Sterilization" means to spay or neuter a dog or cat.

Oklahoma Statutes §499.1

* New Jersey is currently operating a pilot program in select counties requiring animals to be sterilized before adoption.

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State Sterilization Requirements for Adoption

- Many states do not define sterilization but require that animals be sterilized before adoption.
- Example: "It shall be unlawful for any pound, shelter, humane organization, or animal rescue group to release any dog or cat which has not been sterilized to a new owner" (Arkansas Code Annotated A.C.A 20-19-103.)



Model Language

"Sterilization" means the act of permanently rendering an animal incapable of reproduction. The term applies to surgical methods, including the procedures commonly referred to as spay and neuter, and nonsurgical methods and technologies approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration, the United States Department of Agriculture, or other appropriate designated federal authority.

(Colorado Revised Statutes 35-80-102)
